2023 Highlights

Service Delivery

- Vitrectomy Programme Referrals for Vitrectomy which averaged at approximately five annually (pre-COVID), totaled 30 in 2022. Drs Zac Koshy and Lennox Webb of Scotland donated equipment and supplies over the course of three years. With support from Ayr Hospital and Bausch & Lomb as well as many friends and donors in the UK, the first vitrectomy surgeries were done at BCVI in September. Prior to this, patients had to access care in Guatemala. We found that only 20% of our patients were able to do this. Fifteen Vitrectomy surgeries were done in 2023. A first for Belize's National Eye Service!
- Clinic locations As part of our MOU with the Ministry of Health and Wellness, BCVI was thrilled to open our doors in Belmopan at the Western Regional Hospital in 2023. Although we do not have a fulltime Optometrist at the moment, the clinic is being supported by a full-time Ophthalmic Assistant and rotating Optometrists from our other clinics
- Diagnostic Lane In order to effectively meet the needs of our patients, we have dedicated a lane at our Belize City location to Fundus Imaging, Visual Field Testing and OCT exams.

Human Resources

- Scholarships Adarsh Charitable Foundation continues to support BCVI's path to self-sustainability by way of scholarships in Optometry with one new candidate commencing his studies in 2023. We are looking forward to having one of our Optometrists and one Ophthalmologist return in 2025.
- Staff development Freddy Nicholson (Programme Officer) and Visiting Specialists continue to provide training in eye care for our clinical and rehabilitation teams. As many staff members are quite new, we provide basic training in eyecare and the leading causes of blindness in Belize. International visitors have also supported our team and patients throughout the year with provision of services as well as training. Increasing the capacity of our specialized staff members is essential in strengthening our programme.





Primary Eye Care

In addition to our five Primary Clinics located throughout the country, BCVI also conducts outreach clinics to towns, villages, schools and businesses. Our teams of Optometrists and Ophthalmic Assistants screen and examine patients presenting with eye problems. Through our Optical Lab BCVI is able to provide high-quality, low-cost options to our patients. Those who cannot benefit from glasses are referred to the Ophthalmologist in the Secondary Eye Care Programme.

In 2023, BCVI examined a total of 11,585 (3,000 more than in 2022). This increase was also visible in the numbers of prescription glasses dispensed which increased by more than 1,000 compared to the previous year.

Secondary Eye Care

leading cause of blindness in Belize. In 2023, our team restored vision to 319 patients through phaco and manual small incision cataract surgeries. We also resumed pterygium surgeries (4) and continue to treat children in need of surgery (24) thanks to World Pediatric Project. We are fortunate to have Ophthalmic Nurse, Sister Alice Lewis supporting Nurse Angela Choc in the operating room.

Patients with Glaucoma are treated by Dr Diaz with medication and monitored regularly. Through our decade-long partnership with Storm Eye Institute, four

patients also received Trabeculoplasty laser treatment

due to uncontrollable pressure from Glaucoma.

Webb and Dr Andrew Merkur visited Belize and conducted more than 200 laser treatments throughout the country.

After four years of planning, Dr Zac Koshy and Dr Webb implemented the Vitrectomy Programme in September, performing 15 of the tertiary care surgeries. The duo also performed cataract surgery for four patients with severe retinopathy. This marks a historical moment for Belize's eye care service!



Rehabilitation & Education

In 2023, we received a total of 34 new clients taking Belize's Blind Register up to 1, 476 people. With this case number, Human Resources remain a big priority and we were thrilled to welcome Mya Musa to the team in the role of Rehabilitation Field Officer (RFO) for Belize District. Pre-recorded training sessions with Joan Samuels were very helpful as well as guidance from Education Coordinator Sagrario Clarke. However, we have identified the need for practical training which we hope to conduct in 2024 with former Rehabilitation Coordinator, Joan Samuels and Canadian Low Vision Specialist Sheila Jamieson.

The rehab team successfully organized and hosted the first low vision clinic of the year. This clinic provided vital services to individuals with visual impairments. Some clients were transferred to the blind list, as they have lost their remaining vision since their last assessment. The RFOs began rehab training to fit the unique needs of each client. Magnifiers, glasses and telescopes are prescribed and donated to all patients as needed.

Our students and families were overjoyed that BCVI was able to host our Annual Summer Camp for the first time since 2019! A total of 23 clients attended, supported by their chaperones, 12 volunteers, 4 Special Education officers and BCVI staff. We are extremely thankful to our donors and to Stella Maris who kindly hosted the camp. The clients enjoyed the various trips and activities, which included going to Goff's Caye, watching a movie at Princess, and a trip to Guanacaste Park hosted by the Belize Audubon Society. While Technology and Orientation and Mobility were the focus of the camp, the clients especially enjoyed interacting with their peers, playing games and partaking in arts and crafts.

BCVI continues to work alongside the Ministry of Education and NaRCIE to provide orientation for teachers. As we move forward, the RFOs remain committed to serving

individuals with visual impairments and promoting community-based rehabilitation. We will continue to host clinics, conduct outreach activities, and provide support to both new and existing clients. Our goal is to ensure that all individuals with visual impairments have access to the resources and assistance they need to thrive.



Visitors & Volunteers

We are fortunate to have the support of Optometrists, Ophthalmologists and Specialists throughout the year who provide treatment for our patients and continued education for our team.

Benji Chandra, an Optometrist from the UK, visited BCVI for the first time, providing clinical support and training in primary and secondary care. Optometrist from the US, Hal Breedlove, also supported the PEC programme, examining patients in o<mark>ur prim</mark>ary clinics throughout Belize. These v<mark>isits h</mark>ave been a huge help as we are short on Optometrists to staff each of our five clinics.

Dr. Kinloch Nelson's team visited seven schools in the Cayo District, screening more than 850 students and teachers. Approximately 300 refractions were done and 62 patients were identified as needing glasses - all of whom received thanks to support from Grace and Unity Church who partnered with BCVI to have the glasses generated. Dr Micheal Baughan and his VOSH Team returned to BCVI in September examining hundreds of patients in Belize City and prescribing glasses for those in need.

Dr. Baxter McLendon visited in January and July during which he examined 175 patients throughout the country at BCVIs satellite clinics and provided laser treatment for Glaucoma.

Dr. Michael Wong & Team visited in January, our first cataract mission for the year, during which he examined 60 patients and performed 45 surgeries including glaucoma trabeculoplasty. Storm Eye Institute's (SEI) first visited three times in 2023. The teams led by Dr. Chuck Beischel, Dr Matt Nutaitis and Dr Eliza Barnwell examined a total of 64 patients and performed 56 cataract surgeries. During his visits in May and October, Ophthalmologist Dr David Boes examined more than 100 patients and performed 73 cataract surgeries. We were thrilled to welcome back Dr Edgar Ogaldez who performed 52 manual cataract surgeries in two days! Dr Juan Pablo Tovar, a colleague of Ogaldez, also from Guatemala, visited BCVI twice in 2023 - his first visits to BCVI! He examined 85 patients, performing 71 cataract surgeries and a pterygium surgery as well! Ophthalmologists from the Far Eastern Medical Hospital in Taiwan (FEMH) returned to BCVI and performed cataract, oculoplastic and pterygium surgeries.


We are fortunate to still have support from World Pediatric Project (WPP) who continue to provide surgeries and treatment for children in need. Although issues with the phacoemulsification machine prevented them to conducting cataract surgeries, the team operated on 22 children needing strabismus surgeries.

In addition to supporting the Scholarship programme for Belizeans in eye care, Dr. Inder Singal continues to provide much-needed treatment for people throughout Belize. During his visits in 2023, Singal examined 160 patients provided retinal laser treatment for 90 patients. He is also supporting the development of the Vitrectomy Programme at BCVI implemented by Dr Zac Koshy and Dr Lennox Webb in September when they performed our first 15 procedures despite limitations with equipment. Dr Andrew Merkur a Retinal specialist from Canada visited BCVI twice for the first time in 2023, examining patients and providing laser treatment for patients throughout the country. Dr Merkur has been instrumental in not only conducting vitrectomy surgeries, but also providing essential supplies.

Sustainability

BCVI's primary eye care continues to be our largest source of income, supporting our rehabilitation programme which is offered free of cost. Government of Belize continues to support and we were fortunate to receive the NHI Contract in Ophthalmology for Orange Walk (in addition to the continued contracts for Southside Belize City and Southern Region). Adarsh Charitable Foundation continues to fund scholarships for our students in eye care with four currently in the process of completing their studies.

Despite an increase in income of about \$300,000 from the previous year, we still took a loss of approximately \$102,000. This is due, in part, to the five additional staff members hired countrywide as well as the global increase in the cost of supplies for our Optical Lab.

In addition, since 2020, BCVI has been tracking the total amount of assistance provided to patients who are unable to pay for services in the primary and secondary programmes. This continues to increase as do our patient numbers and in 2023, our assistance totaled about \$72,000.



Looking Forward

BCVI continues to focus on Staff Development as we see an increase in turnover of employees. With Freddy Nicholson taking on the role of Programme Officer, our aim is to provide continuous training and support for our national team. This will become easier when we are fully staffed with Optometrists in our District Clinics which we anticipate will be in 2024 and 2025 when two students return to BCVI from Optometry Certification in Guatemala.

Community-based service delivery remains at the heart of BCVI's programmes and we look forward to increasing outreach services to schools with the support of Pediatric Ophthalmologist Dr. Millicent Peterseim who will work along with the Orange Walk Team in 2024.

Blindness due Diabetic Retinopathy remains a concern, particularly in the Northern Region where the incidence is higher and uptake for laser treatment is low. BCVI will be expanding our reach in the Orange Walk District with education and screening in the hopes of identifying patients in need of treatment. With a steady rotation of Retinologists we will be able to offer continued support for those in need. These specialists will also provide more regular vitrectomy surgeries for patients in Belize.

BCVI data shows that 80% of our patients with Diabetes access our service via referrals from provider within the National Health Insurance (NHI) programme. With coverage now extended to Orange Walk, we are hopeful that this will improve patient education to live more healthy lifestlyes and prioritize eye care to reduce blindness due to diabetic retinpathy.

Glaucoma is another area of concern and we are fortunate to have the support of retinal specialist Dr Inder Singal who will be visiting more frequently and is also in the process of acquiring laser equipment to treat patients and hopefully reduce the incidence of blindness due to Glaucoma.

BCVI's former Rehabilitation and Education Coordinator, Joan Samuels, has provided virtual training sessions and support for our Rehabilitation Field Officers (RFOs). In 2024, we hope that she will visit Belize to conduct practical training in Orientation and Mobility and Daily Living Skills.


